## APPROACHING OTHER CHILDREN

NO parent/carer should directly approach another person's child. If you do need to discuss issues concerning your child, please speak with your child's class teacher in the first instance and then to the Stage Assistant Principal who has direct responsibility for supporting and supervising the classes, students and staff. The school will deal with issues between students in line with the Pastoral Care Policy, Anti Bullying Policy and Behaviour Management Plan.

In very rare cases, where people wishing to express concerns, do so in an aggressive, threatening or violent manner, the Principal (or nominee) has the legal authority under the Inclosed Lands Act to:

- Direct the person to immediately leave the grounds.
- Call the police to remove the person should he/she • refuse.
- Withdraw future permission (by letter) for the person • to enter the grounds without permission of the principal.
- Seek further legal avenues.

## **CHECK-IN ASSESSMENT**

This year, Year 3 and Year 5 students will participate in a new reading and numeracy check-in assessment in Term 3, 2020.



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The check-in assessment is a NSW Department of Education online reading and numeracy assessment available to support schools to assess and monitor Year 3 and Year 5 student learning following the period of learning from home.

The check-in assessments can supplement existing school practices to identify how students are performing in literacy and numeracy and to help teachers tailor their teaching more specifically to student needs.

- The assessment will be scheduled for our Year 5 students from 24 August to 4 September 2020.
- The assessment will be scheduled for our Year 3 students from 21 September to 23 October 2020.

## HIGH POTENTIAL AND GIFTED STDUENTS

All students need to have learning experiences that they find engaging and challenging. Schools provide a range of extended learning and enrichment opportunities so that their high potential and gifted students engage with learning that challenges their thinking, further develops their knowledge or skills and advances their understanding.

#### What do we mean by high potential and gifted?

Professor Françoys Gagné suggests that potential exists along a continuum, where given optimal conditions, high potential can lead to high performance and achievement. Gagné outlines that students may exhibit potential in one or more domains including intellectual, creative, social-emotional, and physical. High potential and gifted students are found across diverse family, socio-economic, language, cultural backgrounds and different geographic locations.

#### What's the difference between high potential and gifted, or even highly gifted students?

High potential students are those whose potential exceeds that of students of the same age in one or more domains: intellectual, creative, social-emotional and physical. They may benefit from an enriched or extended curriculum and learning opportunities beyond the typical level of their age peers.

Gifted students are those whose potential significantly exceeds that of students of the same age in one or more domains: intellectual, creative, social-emotional, and physical. They typically develop talent and achieve mastery notably faster than their age peers.

Highly gifted students are those whose potential vastly exceeds that of their age peers in one or more domains. Highly gifted students have potential assessed in the top 1% or less of age peers.

The characteristics listed below may be found in many learners but are strongly evident in high potential and gifted learners. Conversely, not all high potential and gifted learners will display all of these characteristics due to lack of opportunity, disability or disadvantage. High potential and gifted children tend to:

- be intensely curious ٠
- learn new ideas or skills quickly and easily
- be intrinsically motivated and goal driven, particularly in their • area of interest
- display a good memory .
- demonstrate a strong sense of moral reasoning and justice •
- ask complex questions
- be creative

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- enjoy thinking in complex ways
- require fewer repetitions when learning new things
- become intensely focused in their area of interest or passion.







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

A rapid rate of learning means these children may enjoy opportunities beyond the typical level of other children their age.

#### Supporting potential at home

Support your child according to their age, and the availability of resources. Some ideas include:

- provide explorative activities in your child's areas of interest
- engage in discussions and conversations about the world ٠ around them
- encourage questioning, exploration and curiosity
- place value on learning
- monitor play activities to ensure a healthy balance, particularly when younger
- discuss how learning is about making mistakes, struggling at • times, and not always about being the best at everything all the time. Try using role model examples in their area of interest, so they understand that life doesn't always give them what they expect
- praise and celebrate effort working together to understand . that effort and achieving one's personal best are important in maintaining a healthy perspective. Try discussing characters from the books they are reading to highlight the types of behaviours that return positive outcomes
- champion your child's successes and coach them through ٠ their setbacks - point out that mistakes are evidence of learning and experiencing struggle often encourages resilience, persistence and eventual success. Try discussing the great inventions we experience in life today, which are thanks to those who paved the way in making mistakes and yet persisting despite initial failures
- work on areas of strength without ignoring those areas which also need support
- access extra-curricular opportunities ٠ (the <u>Active</u> Kids and Creative Kids vouchers are available to help fund some activities)
- advocate for your child's unique needs and seek support where you can
- if you suspect disability contact organisations such as Gifted • Learners with Disability Australia.

- The online application process is currently restricted to:
- · Enrolments into local schools only
- Children who are Australian citizens, New Zealand citizens or permanent residents
- Children who live in NSW.

## **SCHOOL GROUNDS - ARRIVALS & DISMISSALS**

It is very important that parents follow our clear advice not to congregate at school. Teachers supervise students from 8:40 am each morning in the playground. While normally it is okay

for parents to wait for class to start, at the moment parents and other visitors are not permitted into the school grounds of a morning. This decision has been made in line with health and Department of Education advice.

In order to help with this, **it is vital that parents follow the physical distancing requirements**. In the morning, parents are to drop their children at the gate and not enter the school grounds. We have considered applying this same instruction to the afternoon pick-ups, but we have a number of concerns including parents congregating at gates and the safety of children, particularly those in younger grades, leaving the school grounds unaccompanied. As such, we are relying on our parents to do the right thing. Parents of students in Years 3 to 6 are encouraged to meet their children at a designated location outside of the school grounds. For parents of younger children who cannot do this, please maintain physical distancing while waiting for your children and then leave the school promptly upon collecting them.





## **COVID-19 UPDATE**

Schools continue to be safe, and operations are in line with Australian Health Protection Principal Committee and NSW Health advice. The advice and guidelines have been updated as of 17 August 2020. Please see <u>COVID 19 UPDATE 180820</u> for more information.

Please note, **any adult who enters the school office is required to sign in with their name and phone number** regardless of the amount of time spent on site. For late arrivals, parents/carers are strongly encouraged to ring the buzzer at school gate 3 on Medlow Dr (near the admin block) and *kiss and drop* their child.



## **COMPULSORY SCHOOL ATTENDANCE**

Education for your child is important and regular attendance at school is essential for your child to achieve their educational best and increase their career and life options. NSW public schools work in partnership with parents to encourage and support regular attendance of children and young people. When your child attends school every day, learning becomes easier and your child will build and maintain friendships with other children.

#### What are my legal responsibilities?

Education in New South Wales is compulsory for all children between the ages of six years and below the minimum school leaving age. The Education Act 1990 requires that parents ensure their children of compulsory school age are enrolled at, and regularly attend school, or, are registered for homeschooling. Once enrolled, children are required to attend school each day it is open for students.

#### My child won't go to school. What should I do?

You should contact the classroom teacher as soon as possible to discuss the issue and ask for help. Strategies to help improve attendance may include a referral to the school's learning and support team or linking your child with appropriate support networks. The school may seek further support from the Home School Liaison Program to develop an Attendance Improvement Plan.



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#### What if my child has to be away from school?

On occasion, your child may need to be absent from school. Following an absence from school you must ensure that within 7 days you provide your child's school with a verbal or written explanation for the absence. However, if the school has not received an explanation from you within 2 days, the school may contact you to discuss the absence. Principals may decline to accept an explanation that you have provided if they do not believe the absence is in the best interest of your child. In these circumstances your child's absence would be recorded as unjustified. When this happens the principal will discuss their decision with you and the reasons why.

Principals may request medical certificates or other documentation when frequent or long term absences are explained as being due to illness. Principals may also seek parental permission to speak with medical specialists to obtain information to collaboratively develop a health care plan to support your child. If the request is denied, the principal can record the absences as unjustified

#### What might happen if my child continues to have unacceptable absences?

It is important to understand that the Department of Education may be required to take further action where children of compulsory school age have recurring numbers of unexplained or unjustified absences from school. Some of the following actions may be undertaken:

• **Compulsory Schooling Conferences** 

You may be asked, along with your child, to attend a Compulsory Schooling Conference. The conference will help to identify the supports your child may need to have in place so they attend school regularly. The school, parents and agencies will work together to develop an agreed plan (known as Undertakings) to support your child's attendance at school.

Application to the Children's Court – Compulsory • Schooling Order

If your child's attendance at school remains unsatisfactory the Department may apply to the Children's Court for a Compulsory Schooling Order. The Children's Court magistrate may order a Compulsory Schooling Conference to be convened.

Prosecution in the Local Court

School and Department staff remain committed to working in partnership with you to address the issues which are preventing your child's full participation at school. In circumstances where a breach of compulsory schooling orders occurs further action may be taken against a parent in the Local Court. The result of court action can be the imposition of a community service order or a fine.

#### Working in Partnership

The Department of Education recognises that working collaboratively with students and their families is the best way to support the regular attendance of students at school.








## SCHOOL STREAM

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## School Opal Cards for bus travel

As part of our campaign against fare evasion, and our on-going commitment to provide the level of service needed to transport students to and from your school, Busways conducts regular checks of School Opal card.

All students must be in possession of a valid Opal card or pay a fare.

Students in possession of an Opal card must also tap on/off with their card when boarding our buses.

This is important, because the Opal data collected determines the level of service we are able to provide to your school. If students don't tap on and off, the services will appear under utilised and may be considered for cancellation based on low passenger numbers.
